

MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL  
WESTFIELD, MASSACHUSETTS  
MAY 5, 2016

At 6:30 PM, Mayor Sullivan gave a briefing to the full Council of items on the current agenda under Communications from the Mayor.

In the absence of the President, the meeting was called to order in the City Council Chamber, Municipal Building, 59 Court Street, Westfield, MA at 7:00 PM by Councilor VanHeynigen.

Upon motion of Councilor Flaherty, it was  
VOTED: That Councilor VanHeynigen be nominated as President Pro Tempore. With no other nominations being offered, nominations were closed.

Upon motion of Councilor Flaherty, it was  
VOTED: That Councilor VanHeynigen be elected as President Pro Tempore.

President Pro Tempore VanHeynigen assumed the Chair.

The City Clerk called the roll. Councilor Bean was absent.

The Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States was led by the President.

Westfield State University students Michele Brooks, Michelle Coombs and Caleb Alvord gave a power point presentation on their Westfield Ban the Bag Project.

The presentation highlighted the following topics:

Background: The Hazards of Plastic Bags

Made from Polyethylene, a petrochemical derived from crude oil and natural gas

Durable material causes bags to persist in the environment

Plastics leach the chemical additives they are composed of

Plastics in the ocean accumulate persistent organic pollutants (POPs) including PCB's PAH's and DDT

These pollutants are transported up the food chain, presenting human health hazards

The project included:

Background scientific findings on the negative health and environmental effects of plastic bags.

Interview responses from leaders of plastic bag ban campaigns across Massachusetts.

Interview findings from Northampton business owners and store managers on the effects of the January 1, 2016 plastic bag ban.

Information gained from interactions with Westfield residents during our public outreach campaigns.

Based on our research, we recommend  
Westfield adopt a plastic bag reduction ordinance.

Key Findings from Interviews with MA Plastic Bag Ban Leaders

Twenty-six (26) communities in Massachusetts have bans; twenty-five (25) of these adopted in last four years

Of the 8 Massachusetts communities represented in the survey, leaders reported:

Citizens reacted generally positively when the ban was passed.

Local businesses were canvassed and owners concerns addressed.

Public education and engagement is a necessary component.

Some communities found modifications were needed to improve effectiveness.

Northampton Bag Ban - Interview Results

Northampton's Single Use Plastic Bag Ban went into effect on January 1, 2016.

We chose 15 retail establishments of varying types, including clothing stores, shoe stores, book stores,

grocery stores, etc. and interviewed store managers or owners.

Of the stores that stopped using plastic bags due to the plastic bag ban, a majority reported that there were few to no complaints from customers.

Stores forced to switch to paper bags reported overwhelmingly that there was no effect on store sales.

Of the 15 businesses surveyed:

9 stores are now using paper bags.

3 stores offer a reusable plastic bag.

5 stores have started selling canvas totes with their logo printed on the side.

Overall, almost half of the stores noticed an increase in people bringing their own bags.

Reflection of Public Outreach

During the four days of outreach received over 100 signatures on the citizen petition to support a plastic bag ban. With the inclusion of an online version of the petition the total is nearly 150 signatures.

Received support and praise from almost all passersby about our efforts towards passing plastic bag legislation in Westfield.

A few community members expressed opposition. Their main objection was that the local government should not be involved in the matter.

Three key local organizations have endorsed the campaign: Westfield

Concerned Citizens, the Westfield River Watershed Association, and Pioneer Valley Zero Waste.

Recommendations for the City of Westfield

Recommend that the City Council refer the information contained in this project to the Public Health

and Safety Committee for further review.

It is our hope that the Public Health and Safety Committee will use our research as a starting point for a

discussion regarding the implementation of plastic bag reduction legislation.

Recommendations for Westfield Legislation:

Include retail establishments of all sizes in the ordinance  
Set the minimum thickness of plastic bags at 4.0 mils  
Set the implementation period to no longer than 12 months following, 6 months would be even better  
Exempt the plastic bags used for produce/meat/fish (wet items), dry-cleaning, newspapers, bulk food items

Upon motion of Councilor Figy, it was

Prior to the vote, Councilor Figy informed the Council that the matter was discussed at length in Committee with representatives from the Insurance company and

the City's Law Department. He informed the Council that the legislation will give the Mayor the authority to discuss health insurance with all Unions at once, at the present time each individual Union needs to be addressed separately.

Upon motion of Councilor O'Connell, for the Legislative and Ordinance Committee, it was

Councilor Figy informed the Council that the City is paying the appraised value of the land. Councilor Surprise informed the Council that the new owner split the property into two lots, therefore, raising the appraised value.

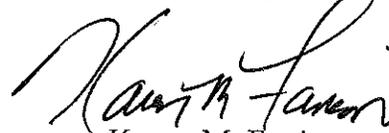

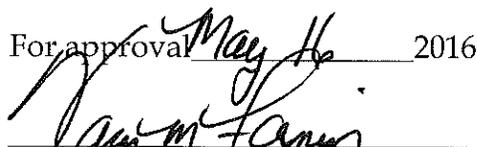
